Spring Wildflowers of Chile ... from desert to forest

Join us as we traverse the mediterranean-climate region of central Chile from the edge of the Atacama Desert southward to the temperate rainforest. We'll focus on the matorral, Chile's Mediterranean shrub vegetation characterized by winter rainfall and summer drought. The matorral is remarkably similar to California's chaparral, with the addition of cacti and geophytes. We'll also visit a number of private gardens featuring native and other mediterranean-climate plants, including wine estates with interesting gardens.

If the rains have been good there will be a pre-tour option farther north to see the "desierto florido" ("flowering desert") with carpets of bulbs and other wildflowers.



Daily Itinerary

SEPTEMBER 25: ARRIVAL INTO SANTIAGO INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT

A.M. Reception at Santiago airport and transfer to your hotel. We will have lunch in Santiago's artsy, bohemian neighborhood of Bellavista, at Patio Bellavista, a dining and shopping center that promotes Chilean handicrafts, culture, and cuisine. After lunch we will visit Bellavista's main attraction, La Chascona, one of the three houses (now museums) of famous Chilean poet Pablo Neruda, who won the Nobel Prize in 1971. Later, there will be a possible visit to Los Dominicos Handicraft Village, with interesting workshops of local artists. We will end the day with a welcome dinner.

SEPTEMBER 26: SANTIAGO



In the morning we will drive to the top of Cerro San Cristobal, the second highest point in Santiago, on a spur of the Andes reaching into the center of the city. On its slopes is the Parque Metropolitano, a large, forested urban park with spectacular views of the city and home

to the Municipal Zoo as well as gardens. We will visit the Jardín Botánico Mapulemu, opened in 1985 and featuring Chile's flora (including local trees such as *Acacia caven*, *Podocarpus nubigenus*, *Peumus boldus*, and others). We will have lunch at Camino Real, a restaurant with wine tasting and a wine museum and wonderful views of the city. In the afternoon we will see the Ch-



agual Botanic Garden Project, currently under development on the lower slopes of Cerro San Cristobal. This new garden will showcase the flora and landscapes of Chile as well as feature a "homoclimatic garden" comparing the flora of the world's five mediterranean climate zones, one of which is in central Chile. Afterward we will visit the Vivero Pumahuida, where owner Monica Musalem will give us a guided tour of this nursery and garden devoted to Chilean native plants. Dinner will be on your own this evening to explore local restaurants in the area.

SEPTEMBER 27: SANTIAGO-LA SERENA

9:00 Transfer to airport to take flight to La Serena. Transfer to Hotel for accommodation and lunch by the sea shore. In the afternoon, there will be free time to enjoy the beach or visit La Recova handicraft market or the adjacent Archaeological Museum. We will have dinner at a local restaurant. This evening, we will offer an optional night visit to Collowara observatory at Andacollo (1 hour from La Serena) \$15.00 per person (2 person minimum).

Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner

SEPTEMBER 28: LA SERENA – TERMAS DE SOCOS

We will spend the day at Parque Nacional Bosque de Fray Jorge, a UNESCO World Biosphere Reserve at a remarkable site where the semiarid desert meets moist forest. The relict Valdivian forest here, with flora more typical of hundreds of kilometers south, is dependent on the *camanchaca*, the coastal fog that condenses on the steep escarpment here. We drive through a pastoral scene of rural haciendas and semidesert with tall columnar cacti, slowly climbing through ever more lush vegetation filled with spring bulbs and wildflowers. At the



crest of the Altos de Talinay a boardwalk leads through the fog forest to an incredible overlook of the steep escarpment and Pacific Ocean below. This small “fog forest” is a remnant of a wetter period in Chile’s geologic history when this type of moist forest covered much more of the country. With luck we’ll spot Chile’s national flower, the Copihue (*Lapageria rosea*), otherwise next seen 1250 kilometers southward. We will have a box lunch here. Return to Termas de Socos in the late afternoon, where you can relax in the thermal waters or enjoy some of the spa services before dinner at the hotel.

SEPTEMBER 29: TERMAS DE SOCOS - ZAPALLAR

Today we travel south along the coast to Los Vilos, where we will visit Bahia Azul, the private home and garden of Chile’s most celebrated landscape architect, Juan Grimm. Perched on the cliffs overlooking the ocean, the home and garden blend into the landscape. A path through the garden of Chilean native and mediterranean climate plants descends to a serene pool at the edge of the sea. Juan will host us for lunch here. In the afternoon we continue southward to explore the colorful vegetation of the Los Molles area. The coastal matorral here much resembles the coastal chaparral of California, with the addition of cacti, puyas, and geophytes. Yellow senecios and blue nolas are among the spring flowers to be seen here. Continue on to the seaside resort town of Zapallar where we will lodge for the next two nights.



Dinner will be at the hotel tonight.

Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner

SEPTEMBER 30: ZAPALLAR

This morning we will visit the private garden of Tomas Muller in nearby Papudo. The contemporary house faces the ocean and straddles a gorge and features a garden designed by Juan Grimm. The ocean-facing garden of native plants is integrated into the existing natural vegetation with a small beach and viewpoint. We will then visit Cerro la Cruz, a small granitic peninsula at the edge of Zapallar set aside as a natural reserve. Trails winding through the flora offer spectacular coastal views. *Puya venusta* clings to the rocky slopes, intermixed with *Lobelia polyphylla*, *Fuchsia lycioides*, and terrestrial orchids. With luck we’ll see the Giant Hummingbird (*Patagona gigas*), the largest hummingbird species, sipping nectar from the puyas. We will be hosted for lunch by



Antonia Echenique, Executive Director of Chagual Botanic Garden, at her weekend home El Pangué right on the beach. Following lunch we will have a hike in the Quebrada el Tigre. The tall, fog-trapping coastal hills above Zapallar support another moist “fog-oasis” forest in this region of otherwise matorral vegetation. Huge old trees of Olivillo (*Aextoxicon punctatum*), Peumo (*Cryptocarya alba*), and Belloto del Norte (*Beilschmiedia miersii*) are surrounded by wildflower meadows with geophytes such as *Tecophilaea violacea* and terrestrial orchids such as *Gavilea sinuata*. Returning to town, we will have time to relax before our dinner at El Chiringuito, one of Zapallar’s best restaurants with its spectacular seaside setting and daily fresh catch.

OCTOBER 1: ZAPALLAR – LA CAMPANA

Leaving Zapallar this morning we’ll stop at



Cachagua Beach to see the Humboldt penguins on Isla de los Pingüinos just offshore. We’ll visit the Tomas Allende garden at Quillota, designed by Juan

Grimm. Lunch will be at a local restaurant in Ocoa. In the afternoon we will visit Parque Nacional La Campana, perhaps the best remaining site to see large stands of one Chile’s two native palms, *Jubaea chilensis*, harvested to near-extinction to make *miel de palma* (palm



honey), a sweet syrup that was a major local source of sugar in the 17th and 18th centuries. The remaining palms are now strictly protected. The palms stand among typical matorral vegetation

with trees such as Quillay (*Quillaja saponaria*) and Maiten (*Maytenus boaria*) and shrubs such as Mayu (*Sophora macrocarpa*), among many

others, all intermixed with cacti and puyas. Leaving the park we’ll visit the Viña Seña bio-dynamic vineyard, set into the natural vegetation surrounding the park; the developed landscape was designed by Juan Grimm. Here we will relax and enjoy the wine before returning to Santiago. Dinner is on your own this evening.

OCTOBER 2: SANTIAGO – SANTA CRUZ

This morning we will visit one of Chile’s best known wineries, Concha y Toro, on the outskirts of Santiago. We will continue to our hotel for lunch and lodging for tonight, the splendid Hotel Santa Cruz, where you are free to relax for the remainder of the afternoon before dinner at the hotel or visit the adjacent Museo de Colchagua, Chile’s largest private museum and considered one of its best. Assembled by the owner of the hotel, the eclectic collection includes geologic and paleontologic specimens, folk art, pre-Columbian art, clothing, conquest-era artifacts, and a remarkable collection of antique carriages and farm machinery.

Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner

OCTOBER 3: SANTA CRUZ - TALCA

In the morning we will head to Parque Nacional Radal Siete Tazas, best known for the series of seven waterfalls (the “seven cups”, or *siete tazas*). This is a transition zone from the sclerophyllous evergreen matorral to wetter mixed evergreen/deciduous forest with larger trees including Ciprés de la Cordillera (*Austrocedrus chilensis*) and Southern beeches (*Nothofagus* spp.) and shrubs such as *Fabiana imbricata*. We’ll enjoy a box lunch here before short walks to see the waterfalls and flora.

Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner

OCTOBER 4: TALCA - CHILLAN

Today we will visit two national reserves near the coast. First is Los Ruiles, which aims to protect the Ruil (*Nothofagus alessandri*), found only in a few small areas. The evergreen coastal forest here includes species of *Azara*, *Ugni*, *Berberis*, and *Desfontainia spinosa* (right). We'll enjoy a box lunch before continuing along the coast, where the red-flowered amaryllid *Phycella bicolor* and impressive *Lobelia tupa* shrubs can be spotted. In the afternoon we'll visit Los Queules, preserving one of Chile's most special endemic trees, *Gomortega keule*, in its own plant family. This rare tree is in danger of extinction, known only from this small coastal region. Other flora to be seen here include *Luma apiculata* and *Berberidopsis corallina*.

OCTOBER 5: CHILLAN - TEMUCO



Most of the day will be occupied by our drive to Temuco with lunch enroute. In the afternoon we'll visit Cerro Nielol, a forest park overlooking Temuco and a good place to see Chile's national flower, the Copihue (*Lapageria rosea*), left.

Lodging: Temuco, Hotel Holiday or similar
Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner

OCTOBER 6: CONGUILLIO NATIONAL PARK

Our trip will culminate with a visit to Conguillio National Park, part of a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve featuring some of southern Chile's most dramatic scenery. Our drive from Temuco takes us through the communities and farms of the indigenous Mapuche indians. Rounding the bend into the bare lava landscape of El Escorial, the imposing Volcan Llaima



comes into view. It is of Chile's largest and most active volcanoes and small explosive ash eruptions have occurred in the last ten years. We drive across the immense lava field, spotting occasional signs of plant life including carpets of lichens. It is here that we will see some of the best forests of Chile's iconic national tree, the Pehuén or Monkey Puzzle Tree (*Araucaria araucana*). Abundant wildlife such as the elusive Pudu and Puma, as well as birds including Slender-billed Parakeet and Black Woodpecker are found here. After lunch by the shores of Lago Conguillío, we will have a walk among some of the oldest and most majestic pehuéns in the park, including to the "Araucaria Madre" ("mother tree"), estimated to be 1500 years old. The sight of Volcan Llaima through the forest is unforgettable. We return to Temuco for our farewell dinner.

OCTOBER 7: TEMUCO – SANTIAGO – USA (OR START OPTIONAL POST TOUR)



This morning we transfer from the hotel to the airport. Those going on the post-tour will fly in the early morning from Temuco to Calama. Those going home will go to the airport

at 10:30 for a 12:15 flight from Temuco to Santiago to connect to flights to USA. Depending on flight times, there may be an opportunity to leave luggage at the airport and take a city tour of Santiago or visit the Museo Chileno de Arte Precolombino.

Optional Pre-Tour to the Desierto Florido (“Flowering Desert”)

This pre-tour to the Norte Chico to see the wildflowers of the Desierto Florido (“flowering desert”) will only take place if sufficient rain has fallen for the flowers to appear. It is usually not known until August whether this will occur.

SEPTEMBER 20: SANTIAGO - BAHIA INGLESA

Arrival from USA in time to connect directly to morning or afternoon flight to Copiapo. (If you cannot arrange a flight that arrives early enough, you will need to arrive on September 19. This additional night lodging will be at your expense but we can easily make arrangements for you.)

Lodging: Bahia Inglesa, Hotel Rocas de Bahia

Meals included: Dinner at Domo

SEPTEMBER 21: BAHIA INGLESA - QUEBRADA EL LEON - PAN DE AZUCAR

We drive north past Caldera, stopping first at Quebrada el Leon. We follow the flower-filled broad wash with *Argylia radiata* (left) back toward the rocky hillsides of the Sierra Pajonales and the Sierra Los Leones,



where columnar cacti, *Alstroemeria violacea*, *Euphorbia lactiflua*, and other colorful plants abound. Continuing northward, we head to Parque Nacional Pan de Azucar (“sugar loaf”), which preserves some of Chile’s most spectacular coastal scenery, with steep cliffs reminiscent of California’s



Big Sur, but with desert rather than forest. The Atacama Desert meets the cold Pacific Ocean here and the Coastal Mountain Range traps moisture from the near-constant fog, supporting a wide range of xerophytic vegetation including many endemic cacti, and in years of good winter rain, fields of wildflowers and bulbs. We will take a small fishing boat to visit Pan de Azucar Island, where we can see Humboldt penguins, as well as other sea birds such as pelicans and cormorants and marine mammals such as sea otters.



Lodging: Bahia Inglesa, Hotel Rocas de Bahia

Meals included: Breakfast, Box Lunch, and Dinner

SEPTEMBER 22: BAHIA INGLESA - HUASCO

Today we travel southward to explore the multicolored expanses of the Desierto Florido (flowering desert) along the road from Bahia Inglesa to Totoral to Carrizal Bajo to Huasco. Yellow and pink annual Patas de Guanaco (*Calandrinia litoralis* and *Cistanthe longiscapa*, above) alternate



with bulbs such as sky-blue or white *Celestina* (*Zephyra elegans*) and *Añañuca amarilla* (*Rhodophiala bagnoldii*, right). Several species of cacti and colorful shrubs such as *Balbisia peduncularis* (left) and *Oxalis gigantea* are plentiful. We will lodge in Huasco for the night.



Meals included: Breakfast and box lunch



SEPTEMBER 23: HUASCO - VALLENAR

Today we explore the *quebradas* (gullies) and slopes of Parque Nacional Llanos de Challe, first along the coast north of Huasco, then turning inland at Carrizal Bajo. At Quebrada Oriente one of Chile's most extraordinary



flowers, the Garra de León or Lion's Paw (*Leontochir ovallei* - left) can be seen, along with another special plant, Orejas de Zorro or Fox Ears (*Aristolochia chilensis* - right). Guanaco (camelid relatives of the Andean llama) are often spotted in the hills.

Continuing inland we stop along Quebrada Carrizal and other colorful spots on the way to our destination for tonight, Vallenar.

Meals included: Breakfast and box lunch



SEPTEMBER 24: VALLENAR – LA SERENA

We continue our exploration of the Desierto Florido along the road from Vallenar to Domeyko to La Serena, with side trips (time and road conditions permitting) to Carizallilo, Punta Choros, El



Tofo, and Totoralillo, searching for bulbs such as *Leucocoryne*, *Phycella*, and *Rhodophiala*, annuals such as various *Nolana* and *Cristaria*, and several species of cactus. We will lodge in La Serena for the night.

SEPTEMBER 25: LA SERENA - SANTIAGO

We will catch the first flight from La Serena to Santiago, at which time we will connect with rest of group.

OCTOBER 7: TEMUCO - SAN PEDRO DE ATACAMA – MOON VALLEY

In the morning, transfer to Temuco Airport to take flight to Calama, a mining city located in the middle of the Atacama Desert. Arrive at Calama Airport, transfer to your hotel at San Pedro, an oasis that still keeps an



Andean-Spanish cultural atmosphere, located at 2400 meters (7800 ft) elevation and surrounded by pukarás and archaeological places. In the afternoon, we will take a trip to the Valley of the Moon, considered a marvel of geology. The highlights of our walk will be impressive canyons of salt and majestic dunes, changing their coloration gradually until being crowned by the sunset.

OCTOBER 8: SAN PEDRO – MONJES DE LA PAKANA – LE PAIGE MUSEUM - TULOR

After breakfast, we will have an interesting visit to Monjes de la Pacana (“Pacana Monks”), a very unusual rock formation. Back to San Pedro for lunch and in the afternoon, we will visit the Church (with a ceiling made from wood from the cardón cactus), the charming main Square — seen here with Volcan



Licancabur in the background — and the Gustavo Le Paige Archaeological Museum, with a complete collection of utensils belonging to the Likan-Antay culture.

Meals included: Breakfast



OCTOBER 9: SAN PEDRO – ALTIPLANIC LAKES - ATACAMA SALT FLAT

Departure at 9:00 AM to visit the village of Toconao, an old town built with blocks of volcanic stone. We will visit the Church, which has a beautiful tower and interesting religious imagery in the interior. We will also travel to the Jerez Valley, a fertile green oasis contrasting with the surrounding desert. A white volcanic stone called “liparita” is quarried here for use as building material. Then



we will continue to the impressive Miscanti and Miniques Lagoons where we will have a nice picnic. On our return to San Pedro at sunset, we will visit the Salar de Atacama, a huge salt-flat, particularly to Chaxa Lagoon where large flocks of 3 species of South American flamingos congregate.

OCTOBER 10: SAN PEDRO - GEYSERS DEL TATIO - CALAMA - SANTIAGO



5:00 a.m. departure today to visit one of the most impressive natural phenomena in the highlands: the El Tatio Geysers, where we will have breakfast in front of the impressive plumes, more than 10 meters high. (The steam plumes disappear as the air warms, so the best viewing is at sunrise.) The bravest can take a bath in the natural pool. We will descend from the highland toward Puritama Hot Springs. Keep an eye out for the indig-



enous vicuña (*Vicugna vicugna*) in the high altiplano (right). Back to San Pedro for farewell lunch and transfer to Calama for the last daily flight. Connect to your flight home (some flights may depart Santiago International Airport in the evening on October 10) or transfer from Santiago Airport to your hotel if your flight is on October 11. (Hotel is an additional expense; Hidden Treasures Botanical Tours can make arrangements for this additional night once your flight itinerary is known.)

OCTOBER 11: DEPARTURE FOR USA

Transfer from hotel to Santiago International Airport for your flight home.
